Running out from the shore on the south side of the head of Loch Duich, a wall was built to catch herring.

As high tide approached the rising water level allowed the herring to swim over the wall, later for the level to drop trapping the fish behind it, so that the herring could be harvested on foot. Later the wall was broken rendering it inoperable and the herring could only be caught from fishing boats out on the loch.

The dance reflects the motion of gentle waves & swimming fish, crossing the wall and subsequently flowing out through the breech.

The River Cro slowly meanders down the glaciated valley of Glen Lichd flowing into Loch Beag and under the causeway into Loch Duich.

The river is named after the 'cro' of Kintail where the mountains encircle the low level ground near Morvich as a fold would encircle & protect sheep.

It would be lovely to dance this simple strathspey to the tune of lan MacMhurachaidh's song "Theid mi dhachaidh Chro Cintaille" - "I will go home to the fold of Kintail"

The ridge of mountains on the north side of Glen Shiel known as the Five Sisters of Kintail are named after the legendary princesses who stand waiting, looking out over the loch for their husbands-to-be to come from Ireland after the youngest sister was only allowed to leave for Ireland with her suitoron condition that his five brothers returned to marry her five older sisiters.

Ratagan lies on the south side of Loch Duich just below the road which winds its way up & over the 1000' pass of Mam Ratagan towards Glenelg & the Isle of Skye (by way of the Kylerhea / Glenelg ferry)

It was the drove road whereby the cattle were brought from Skye, swimming across the narrows of Kylerhea, to the markets further south on the mainland.

The good folk of Ratagan knew how to party and in the dance 1st lady can set coquetishly to her partner who then chases, and after setting again they dance off together to 'gather up' the others to join in the circle.

At the time we were in need of a dance where not everyone is moving all at once!

The nickname "Paisley" was given to the area near Shiel Bridge from which Birch wood was shipped south to Paisley to make bobbins for the thread manufacturers there (J&P Coats and J&J Clark) The dance reflects the twilling of weaving and the winding of bobbins.
